

ETUC project Raising awareness on SDG's amid workers and trade union leaders: decent work, environment and rule of law

The United Nations has set 17 global sustainable development goals (SDG). In September 2015, government leaders from 193 countries committed themselves to this sustainable development agenda, including the Netherlands. The goals must be achieved by 2030: *a lot of work to be done!* The Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) monitors the state of affairs in the Netherlands (versus Europe) and annually records the findings in the *Monitor Broad Prosperity & Sustainable Development Goals*.

With the support of the European Commission, ETUC has launched a project to raise awareness of the Sustainable Development Goals among trade unions and to strengthen trade union strategies in the field of SDG: decent work, environment and rule of law. The FNV has subscribed to this project and has been awarded a subsidy for organizing a seminar and producing a report.

The FNV is in various ways involved in these subjects. SDG 8 *Fair Work and Economic Growth* is central to the trade union movement. We combine this vision with SDG 1 *No Poverty*, SDG 3 *Good Health and Wellbeing*, SDG 5, *Gender Equality* and SDG 10 *Reducing Inequality*. We do this nationally, European and globally. Putting economic growth and employment at the center does not mean that we sacrifice other goals, such as the goals that drive a circular economy (SDG 12 *responsible consumption and production*) and a better climate (SDG 13 *Climate action*). The trick is to link the goals in such a way that everyone benefits. There it sometimes seems to be chafing.

The Netherlands has an SDG movement in which more than 1,000 civil society organizations, youth groups, municipalities, financial institutions, educational and knowledge institutions and residents' initiatives participate. Each SDG objective has its own alliance with a plan of action. There is an SDG action day every year. The website <u>www.sdgnederland.nl</u> contains a roadmap in which the action plans are included. As an organization, FNV is not part of the SDG community. Yet many themes affect the policy of the FNV. The question is whether this is because we are not a natural partner for the organizations that are working on it or whether this is because the SDG goals are a long way off for most of us. The fact is that of all FNV sections, only *FNV Mondiaal* refers to the objectives on their website.

Target of the seminar

The SDG goals of the UN are a wonderful stepping stone for making the FNV policy visible and possibly taking it further. We have concrete action points for many of the objectives that we can strengthen in this context.

The aim of the seminar is on the one hand to give more publicity to the FNV administrators in the sectors and regions and on the other hand to give more publicity to what the FNV is doing with regard to the objectives. It is useful to link the seminar to the recovery agenda, in which *greening the economy* plays a major role. It is also useful to look across the border. What program does e.g. the Deutsche Gewerkschaftsbund (DGB) have in this field?

Target audience

Union leaders and executives of the FNV, with an emphasis on Industry, Transport and Logistics, Construction, Energy, the Agricultural sector and Waste (100 people). In addition, some invitees from foreign trade unions, such as the DGB, ABVV and CMKOS, but also the members of the ETUC
